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

# Memory honored with street sign dedication

The 911th Airlift Wing cannot operate without the dedication of its many military and civilian personnel who keep the wing's mission going.

That devotion to duty was personified by Master Sgt. Robert J. D'Amico, a former standard and evaluation loadmaster with the 758th Airlift Squadron, 911th AW, who was remembered in a dedication, held during the November Unit Training Assembly at the 911th AW's Flight Operations Building, bldg. 419. The dedication included naming the street in front of bldg. 419 after him.

"Bob was such a driving force in our unit," said Chief Master Sgt. David McNees, Chief Loadmaster, 758th Airlift Squadron, 911th AW. "This was the only way we could

Master Sgt. D'Amico died September 22, 2008, after a long battle with colon cancer. A cancer that did not seem to take away his

drive to help the 911th AW in any way he could. During his battle with colon cancer, Master Sgt. D'Amico transitioned from his career as a reservist to a civilian with the 911th AW's Operation Group.

"Even through the adversity of cancer, he continued to do his job," Chief McNees said.

Master Sgt. D'Amico is survived by his wife Lisa and his daughter Natalie. Both were in attendance for the dedication, along with members from the 911th AW.

The dedication was the result of numerous efforts. Master Sgt. Bob Hughes, loadmaster with the 758th AS, orchestrated the paperwork necessary to get the street sign named in Master Sgt. D'Amico's honor. While Col. Reuben Knox, Commander of the 758th AS, and Senior Master Sgt. Gail Graise, 1st Sgt., 758 AS, organized the dedication.

While Master Sgt. D'Amico has passed, his memory will live on with the 911th AW. The memory will provide a testament as to what service before self truly means.

schedules volunteers to greet passengers and help them navigate through the airport.

The Airport Ambassadors Program has been in operation since 2001 and has about 70 volunteers.



# CMU, NASA Lunar Rover Initiative launches from Pittsburgh Air Reserve Station

In support of a consolidated lunar research project between Carnegie Mellon University of Pittsburgh, and NASA, the 911th Airlift Wing was called to task to airlift this unique equipment during the months of October and November.

A six-member team from Carnegie Mellon's Robotics Institute, Field Robotic Center, along with four pallets of scientific research equipment flew to Hilo, Hawaii for offload and then the equipment went on to its final destination at Mount Mauna Kea, a volcano that comprises 23 percent of the island of Hawaii and is considered the island's fourth most active volcano.

"The site was selected by a group from NASA," said Mr. Spencer Spiker, the Field Robotics Center's principal research engineer for the project. "It was selected because the soil and terrain at the volcano site most closely resembles

that of the moon."

The purpose of the project, known as the *Lunar Rover Initiative*, was to test a four-wheeled prototype robot's ability to navigate Mauna Kea's surface and take soil samples using its coring drill.

"The robot's particular function is a lunar prospector," said Dr. David Wettergreen, associate research professor at CMU's Robotic Institute.

"The robot, 'Scarab,' is designed to traverse along the moon's surface; take core samples with its onboard drill; extract the samples; pulverized them into tiny grains; heat them to 900 degrees Celsius; then collect and measure the abundance and types of gases," said Dr. Wettergreen.

"The integrated field test exercises an entire lunar scenario," he said. "The purpose of this field test was to pull together all of the pieces to demonstrate a full lunar scenario using the drive, drill, process and analyze cycle onboard 'Scarab.'"

The information gathered by 'Scarab' is important to NASA's lunar program because the robot, once on the moon's surface, can scout for lunar base sites, as well as find locations with the richest available resources, said Dr. Wettergreen.

According to Dr. Wettergreen, polar craters of the moon lie in permanent shadow and may hold water from ice frozen in the deep cold. The

'Scarab' rover was designed to carry a 1-meter coring drill and a payload of science instruments that can analyze the abundance of hydrogen, oxygen and other materials on the moon's surface. It also has a unique transforming chassis that allows it to lay down on the ground to stabilize a drill and also to posture itself for slope ascent and descent. Onboard software controls motions and uses laser scanning technologies to autonomously perceive and navigate terrain in total darkness.

Dr. Wettergreen stated that the project started in May 2007. The 911th AW initially became involved in March 2008, when Mr. Spiker contacted the 911th's current operations section about the possibility of airlifting the equipment.

"They [CMU] gave us the dates they needed, and it was far enough in advance that we were able to make a flight possible for them," said Master Sgt. Kevin George, 911th current operations. "We saw it as a good opportunity for the aircrew to fly the mission, and it was also an opportunity for the Traffic Management Office to work with such unique cargo."


This isn't the first time the 911th AW has helped the CMU Dr. Wettergreen said



the 911th AW airlifted DANTE II, a tethered walking robot, to Alaska in 1994 in order to explore the Mt. Spurr (Aleutian Range, Ala.) volcano.

"Although the next trip to the moon is in a fairly distant timeframe – the year 2025 – there's already discussion for next year's return to Mauna Kea for another round of testing," said Dr. Wettergreen. "We consider the 911th part of the team and I'm sure we'll be calling again as we draw closer to that event."

# Air Force Personnel Center adds new mission

**RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas** – Air Force officials recently announced an added mission for the Air Force Personnel Center to improve the accountability of medical records and aid in the timely processing of veterans' disability claims.

Starting with Randolph AFB as the test base, AFPC will collect and then transfer Health Treatment Records (medical and dental records forwarded together) to the servicing Department of Veterans Affairs location of retired and separated Airmen who left the Air Force after Sept. 1, 2008.

The new mission, directed by the Office of the Undersecretary of Defense, will capitalize on a policy

announced in 2007 to hold medical and dental records at medical treatment facilities 30 days past an Airman's date of separation to capture documentation from medical appointments and procedures toward the end of a member's service. The policy directs all services to transfer medical and dental records to the DVA from a "centralized personnel out-processing location." Therefore, the mission was assigned to AFPC.

"This is not a scanning or storage operation like unit personnel records, but an initiative to ensure complete Health Treatment Records and any late-flowing documents are sent to the VA," said Barbara Duggan, AFPC Records Branch Quality Assurance.

In the case of a late flowing document, if such a late-flowing medical document is forwarded to AFPC by an MTF, the Center can confirm the record was, or was not, already sent to the DVA by annotating a form letter to help ensure a complete record for our Airmen.

"We've worked with the VA to ensure expeditious processing of these late-flowing documents," Ms. Duggan said. "This could be the one document an Airman needs that is holding up their VA disability claim."

Airmen do not have to wait until after they separate or retire to file a disability claim with the DVA. They can file up to six months in advance providing they can be available for DVA medical appointments. In these cases, Airmen can request a copy of their records from their servicing MTF to provide to the DVA. Then, following the new guidelines, the Airman's MTF holds the original record until 30 days after separation or retirement when it is sent to the AFPC Health Treatment Records Central Cell.

"Although the medical records mission is an accountability and transfer function versus scanning, we are confident we will provide a valuable service to the member and to the VA," said Sharon Hogue, Master Personnel Records Branch chief. "When Airmen's medical records are transferred by the Air Force Personnel Center, we will be their advocate if the records are misrouted at some point in the transfer process."

AFPC's new Total Force mission will soon provide accountability for medical and dental records for all retired or separated Airmen – active, Guard and Reserve. The effective start date for members of the Guard and Reserve will be announced later this fall.

This year's Energy Awareness theme for the Pittsburgh International Airport Air Reserve Station is "Secure Today's Energy, Fuel Tomorrow's Mission". Every Airman needs to be aware of the energy they use, and do their part to conserve both at home and on the job. With winter already upon us, the following information below can be used to save energy, and money. **Our homes consume a lot of energy:**

- More than \$160 billion a year to heat, cool, light and live in our homes, and this energy bill continues to grow
- Our homes make up 21 percent of the energy our nation uses each

year and contribute about 17 percent of our nation's emissions of greenhouse gases

While our homes are more efficient today than they were 30 years ago, considerable opportunity remains for greater energy efficiency and a lower energy bill. Many households could save 20-30 percent on their household energy bills through cost-effective household improvements such as:

- Buying more energy-efficient products and appliances
- Sealing air and duct leaks
- Adding insulation

Although the U.S. Department of Energy is working on new energy saving technologies, for many Americans, the benefits of those efforts will not come in time to help them this winter.

**Many Americans will, unfortunately, see higher heating bills this winter**

The Energy Information Administration (EIA) estimates that compared to last year:

- U.S. residential heating oil prices during the 2008-2009 heating season will increase 25 percent
- Residential natural gas prices over the same period will increase 17 percent

# NEWS BRIEFS

## Removable Media Policies

Recently, several incidents of Malware (Malicious software) were transferred to Air Force computers and networks from removable media such as USB flash drives or memory sticks. This led to an initial policy of banning all types of removal USB media from AFRC assets. However that policy was later revised to now allow government owned/purchased USB Hard Drives as the only acceptable USB removable media authorized to be used on government computers and laptops. AFIs that cover removable media are 33-202 and 31-401.

## Saluting for Veterans

A new law authorizes Veterans' salutes during National Anthem. Veterans and active-duty military not in uniform can now render the military-style hand salute during the playing of the national anthem. The new provision improves upon a little known change in federal law last year that authorized veterans to render

the military-style hand salute during the raising, lowering or passing of the flag, but it did not address salutes during the national anthem. Last year's provision also applied to members of the armed forces while not in uniform. For more information, visit [www.va.gov](http://www.va.gov).
