First RODEO Rounds-up best in aerial port competition

32 APS place in top three overall, bring home prized belt buckle

Team members from 19 aerial port units competed at 22nd Air Force's first aerial port Roundup, held at Dobbins Air Reserve Base, Ga., March 13-15. Only a few units left the event knowing that they were at the top of the field.

One of those units knowing they were at the top of the game was the 32nd Aerial Port Squadron, 911th Airlift Wing, placing in the top three of the overall event.

The day's events included five segments that each Airman was required to complete. The portion involving cargo loading took place on a C-130 Hercules aircraft. The segments included Engine Running Off-loading/On-loading, Material Handling Equipment, the Joint Inspection, a Trivia Event, and Fit-to-Fight.

The ERO event required the loading and restraining of a High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle and one cargo pallet. The teams for this event were timed for on-loading and off-loading the HUMVEE onto the C-130. The MHE driving course was also a timed event testing the driving skill of the teams on a test track. The Joint Inspection event included having the team members inspect a HUMVEE and two pallets of hazardous cargo. The additional hazardous cargo was thrown in to test the team's ability to check the hazardous cargo for aerial transport. The trivia event put their knowledge to the test by asking them questions from the Airman's Manual. Finally team members had to complete the

Fit-to-Fight section, which included a 1.5 mile run, push-ups, and sit-ups.

By the end of the Roundup, the 32 APS came away with first place in the Joint Inspection segment. The team was led by Ramp Services Team Lead, Tech. Sgt. Jeffrey Godfrey, and included ramp services Senior Airmen Michael Boehm, Thomas Moore, and Mark Chambers and Airman Melanie Mangan. The team was one of the youngest at the event – some of the Airmen were right out of technical school training.

“We were actually better prepared for the joint inspection,” said Tech. Sgt. Jeffrey Godfrey. “We had some strong joint inspection people here to help aid,” he added.

Playing umpire to the event and aiding the team was Master Sgt. Owen Meier, noncommissioned officer in charge of Cargo Processing for the 32 APS.

“If I saw them doing something

wrong I told them,” said Master Sgt. Meier.

Although he was unable to judge the 32 APS during the competition, he did provide them with some insight on how they could improve their level of performance.

“You had to have the ability to give your team a safety briefing, a plan, and brief the loadmaster to upload cargo in a small amount of time,” said Tech. Sgt. Godfrey. “...all with just hand signals because voice communication was nil,” he added.

Since the 32 APS won one of the segments and was placed in the top three, they went away from the event with an award for each team member. The awards were in the form of an engraved belt buckle with the name of the event mounted in an enclosed frame.

“For our guys to go down there and basically compete with almost zero experience was amazing,” said Master Sgt. Meier.

Air Force streamlines process, goes virtual

Results in paperless system,
easier access for members

The Air Force has recently changed the way members can review their personnel records. No longer will a visit to the military personnel flight be needed to review records. Access can be obtained anywhere and anytime, with access to the internet and the Personnel Records Display Application.

“Everything that you would have had in your files down at the MPF, you now have direct access to online,” said Maj. Charles Knapp, 911th Mission Support Flight Commander.

PRDA is an electronic viewer application that will allow you to obtain your military personnel records through role based access. Role based access is a feature of the application that only allows those with the proper authority to view your records. In most cases it will be the Airman accessing their own records.

However, this feature also comes in handy to senior raters, like commanders, supervisors, first sergeants, etc...

“They will also have the ability to write-up EPRs or decorations from the information,” Maj. Knapp added.

Members of the 911th AW will be able to view their records on PRDA via the Air Force Portal at www.my.af.mil. From there, access the application through the homepage by going under Top Portal Links. Although the Air Force Portal offers a secure website, members are advised to practice operational security when accessing their records.

Although Airmen here are encouraged to visit the 911th MSF website on the Metrics to find information on the application, there are a few other ways of getting answers.

“We are available to answer any questions you may have,” Maj. Knapp said. “However units also have strong command support staffs, which we have trained in a train-the-trainer approach,” he added.

The end product is an application that puts less time into accessing “paperwork” and more time into readiness.

Air Force Personnel Accountability System Kicks-off

The Air Force implemented the Air Force Personnel Accountability and Assessment System April 1, a new program to improve global disaster personnel accountability management, reporting and case management across the Force. The test was conducted during the May Unit Training Assembly.

Designed to coordinate AF reporting with the Department of Defense’s accountability system, AFPAAS meets combatant commander and DoD requirements for personnel tracking by making certain accountability of all AF personnel - to include active duty Airmen and family members, Guardsmen, Reservists, most civilians, and contractors overseas.

An AF-wide exercise held March 16-20 tested the AFPAAS system. The exercise allowed AF leaders to

learn lessons and work through issues before the program went live April 1.

“We did it here but traditional reservists did not participate because it was limited to the people we had here on base during the time,” said Maj. Charles Knapp, 911th Mission Support Flight Commander.

The benefits of AFPAAS include allowing commanders and units to account, assess, manage and monitor the recovery and reconstitution process for personnel and their families affected and/or scattered by a wide-spread catastrophic event, every step of the way.

“It’s a way for the Commander of the Air Force or the Commander of the Air Force Reserve Command to drill down to us here at the 911th Airlift Wing and find out who we haven’t accounted for yet,” Maj. Knapp said. “It gives them an assessment of how we are doing in

our accountability in an exercise or real world event,” he added.

As of April 1, Air Force personnel and family members can log into <https://afpaas.af.mil> or call 1-800-435-9941 to report individual and family member status if affected by a disaster or crisis.

Using AFPAAS also helps speed up the process to help affected family members requiring assistance. AFPAAS helps commanders identify and verify assistance/aid eligibility and entitlements for affected personnel and their families prior to or immediately following a disaster.

Web-based AFPAAS training is available for leadership, commanding officer representatives and readiness personnel, as required, and can be scheduled through major command personnel directorates. For more information about AFPAAS, visit the website or contact your unit commander.

New program offers incentive flight to quarterly award winners

Our first “incentive flight” for quarterly award winners during the May unit training assembly was less of a hit than anticipated, partly due to communication problems and partly due to a simple lack of knowledge on what exactly an incentive flight entails. As a flyer, I took for granted what is involved, and was surprised to hear comments that a lot of folks had no desire to sit in the back of a Herc for two hours and “do nothing.” Hopefully these lines will enlighten you on what the aviators intend to do on these flights.

The standard flight profile involves departing Pittsburgh to the north, flying to Erie, then along the shoreline to Niagara Falls. Weather

permitting, the flight will stay about 2,000 feet above the ground. After an instrument approach at Niagara Falls airport, the crew will fly over Niagara Falls at about 2,500 feet above the ground for a “Falls Tour.”

This is an FAA approved procedure which allows aircraft over-flight of the Falls area. The crew will normally do several turns in orbit so all can get a good look. The aircraft will return to Pitt on a different route. During the approximately two hour flight, the guests will be invited to the cockpit to put on a

headset, look around, and ask questions. Sometimes, a lucky person will be asked to stay in the cockpit for takeoff or landing.

In inclement weather, the crew will pick another destination and fly a similar profile. The intent of these flights is to reward our folks for a job well done.

Save money, improve health

Enroll in base-wide cessation initiative, stop smoking now!

The 911th Aeromedical Staging Squadron is activating a base-wide smoking cessation initiative. According to the office of the Surgeon General's news release (May 27, 2004), tobacco smoking is a direct cause of cancers of the larynx and lung, chronic bronchitis, cancers of the bladder, esophagus, mouth and throat, cardiovascular disease, reproductive effects, cataracts, pneumonia, acute myeloid leukemia, abdominal aortic aneurysm, stomach cancer, pancreatic cancer, cervical cancer, kidney cancer, and periodontitis.

Tobacco use costs billions of dollars in direct medical costs, and lost job productivity due to absence from illness and frequency of tobacco breaks.

Tobacco use affects you – with limitations in health care plans, life insurance policies, employment potential, and cost of living. One pack of cigarettes can cost an average of \$5 – amounting to an average of \$150 a

month. Legislation is pushing for more and more taxes on tobacco that will add to the cost of tobacco use.

Tobacco cessation resources can be located at local VA medical centers and all over the Internet.

Your primary physician should always be involved in a tobacco cessation plan. The most successful tobacco cessation plan will include more than just a pill or patch. Due to the multifaceted affects of tobacco use, a good plan would include an exercise program, diet modification, and a limited psychological/social assessment.

It may be necessary to temporarily modify social activities and contact with tobacco using family, friends, and co-workers. The best offense is a good defense. Avoiding contact with tobacco while trying to kick the habit takes a life style change and long term commitment. A successful plan is to be surrounded by a good support system at home, socially, and at work.

Wings' Civilian Personnel Office gets new director

Mr. Lee Hutchinson is the new Director of Civilian Personnel for the 911th Airlift Wing. In this capacity he oversees the personnel affairs for all civilian and air reserve technicians. He started his career with the 911th AW March 29 after 30 years of government service that included being a traditional reservist, an air reserve technician, and a department of defense civilian employee.

Mr. Hutchinson grew up on a farm in northwestern Ohio, near Toledo. From an early age, he was interested in the military, especially aviation. He was influenced by his father, as well as other family members who had served in the military during World War II and the Korean War. He continued that legacy with the military during the 1970s by joining Bowling Green State University's Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps hoping to later become an active duty Airman. He did this while juggling both college and a job at a gas station.

"That was back in the day when everything was full service and the gas station sold gas, tires, fan belts, air filters," Mr. Hutchinson said.

"Full service in those days meant that you would have to check those things for every car that came in," he added.

During his senior year in college,

there was a reduction in force that occurred in the Air Force, which placed him into the Palace Chase program. The program, meant for separating active duty forces, allowed him to continue his service

with the Air Force Reserve at Youngstown Air Reserve Station, Ohio. Once in the Reserve he started his career as an intelligence officer. Not too long later, in 1979, he was tapped to become a C-130 pilot there. Although becoming a tactics officer at a different unit for a short time, he stayed at Youngtown until 2004.

In 2004, he accepted a position as the 94th Operation Group Commander, Dobbins Air Reserve Base, Ga. Mr. Hutchinson stayed there until he retired as an ART and as a Reservist on March 12, 2006.

Retirement plans, however, did not slow him down. He accepted a civilian position at Hanscom Air Force Base, Mass. as a reserve

advisor working with individual mobilization augmentees. About a year and half into the position at Hanscom AFB, he was moved into the labor relations officer position, where he handled all the labor issues for civilians at the base and New Boston Air Force Station, Mass. He remained there until accepting the Director position at the 911th AW.

Although, it is not Ohio, being at the 911th AW does bring Mr. Hutchinson closer to home.

"A major motivation was getting closer to my kids and grandkids," said Mr. Hutchinson.

In his current position as Director of Civilian Personnel, he manages civilian personnel issues for the entire Wing.

"I understand the Reserve environment since I have worked in it for most of my career," said Mr. Hutchinson.

"The air reserve technician program can be confusing to some people if they aren't familiar with it," he added.

Since being at the 911th AW, he credits the staff here for helping him transition into the position.

"They were without a supervisor for about eight months and did not miss a beat," he said.

While not at work, Mr. Hutchinson's hobbies include computer and board war-gaming as well as attending miniature war-gaming conventions.

"I mostly just go for the games and to look at the models, books, and videos that are for sale there," said Mr. Hutchinson.

Air Force leaders name next top enlisted leader

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Norton A. Schwartz and Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force Rodney J. McKinley have announced the Airman selected to be the service's next enlisted leader.

Chief Master Sergeant James A. Roy will become the 16th Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force during an appointment ceremony on June 30, 2009, which will coincide with Chief McKinley's retirement.

"This is a good day for all Airmen," General Schwartz said. "While they will lose a tremendous leader and advocate in Chief McKinley, they gain a worthy successor in Chief Roy. Given his record and reputation, I am confident that Chief Roy will carry the best interests of our Air Force family forward to our nation's leaders as we support today's joint fight and rebalance our force for the challenges ahead."

Chief Roy and his wife Paula will come to the Pentagon from Camp Smith, Hawaii, where the chief currently serves as the senior enlisted leader and advisor to the U.S. Pacific Command combatant commander, representing more than 200,000 Airmen, Soldiers, Sailors and Marines.

Chief Roy joined the Air Force in 1982. His career includes assignments as a heavy equipment operator in the civil engineer career field and then in leadership positions at the squadron, group, and numbered air force levels. He has served as the command chief master sergeant at wings in Air Education and Training Command, Air Mobility Command and Air Combat

Command. He was also deployed as the command chief master sergeant of the 386th Air Expeditionary Wing in Southwest Asia. Prior to assuming his current position he was the command chief master sergeant for U.S. Forces Japan and Fifth Air Force at Yokota Air Base, Japan.

Chief McKinley will retire next month after serving for 30 years. He has served as the Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force since June 30, 2006.

"Chief McKinley has devoted his entire adult life to our Air Force and to taking care of Airmen and their families," General Schwartz said. "He has accomplished so much throughout his career, but as Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, he and his wife Paula have made monumental contributions."

New club members get 'Instant Payback'

Join Club Cargo Bay today, receive three free months

All eligible personnel who join any Air Force club between June 15 and Aug. 15 will automatically receive three months of free dues as part of the Air Force's 2009 club membership campaign.

New members will also receive the benefits of a free cash back rewards program and a six-month, zero percent annual percentage rate on their club member credit card. Additionally, AF clubs will randomly select 200 members, new and current, to receive \$250 in prizes. Interested members must register using an online survey at www.afclubs.net.

"Our 'Instant Payback' club membership campaign will give all Airmen the opportunity to try their Air Force club for free and see for themselves the many benefits a club membership offers," said Fred McKenny, chief of the Air Force Food and Beverages Division, at Randolph AFB.

AF clubs offer a myriad of free and inexpensive activities including special events like casino nights,

sporting events, themed parties, and special meals for holidays and special occasions. Club members receive discounts on every club meal as well as monthly coupons that can be used at club functions.

In addition to the perks of being a club member, the card itself has numerous benefits, said Mr. McKenny. The military free cash rewards program allows members to earn cash back on purchases. Members can earn cash back on every eligible on-base and off-base purchase.

Members can redeem their points for cash, gift cards, airline tickets, and hotel and car rentals. There is no fee for these card services; they are included as part of the club membership.

"The Club Membership Card Program is administered at virtually no cost to the Air Force, which allows the savings to be returned to club members in the form of programs, facilities, and services," said Mr. McKenny.

"The program establishes and controls credit limits, and institutes a procedure to approve each charge transaction, making it a much more responsible form of credit," he said.

Membership fees help to defray the day-to-day operational costs of the club. Clubs do waive membership fees while personnel are deployed.

Airmen who join during their technical training receive their first year's dues free. After their first year, they pay a reduced rate of no more than \$2-\$4 until they are noncommissioned officers.

"All Airmen should consider club membership because of the many services and benefits Air Force clubs provide for military members and their family members," said Mr. McKenny.

"Your Air Force club is a great place for entertainment, socializing, and meeting new people in a fun and safe environment," he added.

Those eligible to apply are all active-duty members, Reservists, Air National Guard members, Department of Defense civilians and contractors working full time on the installation. Others are eligible as well; please contact your local club for more information.
